#### Learn to Sail

How did you learn to sail? I find it interesting how many different ways sailors became sailors. I grew up sailing on a Honey Bee; I remember it as a slow stable sailboat with an old British Seagull motor. On our old 8mm family film you could see me at three years old pushing the boat off of the beach on the James River, near Jamestown Virginia, part of the lower Chesapeake Bay.

Just before my tenth birthday we moved to Anderson, SC and bought a new Sunfish sailboat. Four years of sailing near exit 19 off I-85. Take exit 19 towards Anderson and as you cross the bridge look right; marker 26 M 26. That is where I was first allowed to go sailing by myself. We then lived for one year in Mebane, NC. No lakes nearby, so **no** sailing. Then two years in Lake Jackson, TX near the Gulf of Mexico. On my sixteenth birthday I got my driver license and I could drive 20 miles to the gulf coast. Back then you could drive on the beach. I'd back in and then go sailing. The ramp I learned to launch on was thirteen miles wide - Freeport to the San Luis Pass. The summer of my seventeenth birthday we moved back to Anderson, SC and Lake Hartwell near White City Park, marker 26 M 8A Salc, or Salem Creek. This is when we had a second Sunfish and I learned to chase after my father, Dick Harder. I could sail two miles to the Hwy 24 bridge and under I would go. That was the only way I could sail around more sailboats.

A couple months after turning twenty I was a full time student with a part time job so I was able to join WCSC. Right away I started crewing with anyone that would allow me to sail with them. Two years later I was asked to crew in the WCSC Club Championship. The next year I started racing a Super Sunfish against the Force 5 fleet here at WCSC. This is when we went from my father teaching me how to sail to me teaching him how to race. Occasionally I would beat the Force 5's boat for boat. I was told at the end of the season that as the only boat in the Portsmouth fleet I could race in the club championship. The club's very old 420's were not in great shape so the race that year was held in the standard Sunfish. I just beat out two-time defending club champion Steve "Fitzsimons" Knatzka. He's the only person to win the WCSC Club Championship under two different names. Three times under the name Steve Fitzsimons and six times as Steven Knatzka. Steve's name was always Knatzka, but club members thought his last name was the same as his mother's Gloria Fitzsimons, now known as Gloria Root.

The next year Carl Ulbrich, who was gone for a year on a sabbatical to Washington DC, loaned me his Force 5 for the 1985 sailing season. By 1986 I bought a used Force 5, sail number 4685. You may notice that as the gate code for the first quarter of this year. I've done a lot of sailing. At the end of the 1986 sailing season my father finally joined WCSC. That's my story about how I learned to sail. - -The dock waiting list is almost non-existent. Of the 6 actives we have on the list, 4 are in temp slip assignments. There are still a number of empty slips. If you have your boat on the causeway, time to move back home.
- Special thanks to Rick Fontenot. He has been meticulously maintaining/improving our fleet of motorized boats used in our racing programs. He is doing a fabulous job. Thanks Rick!!!!
- -The Diva Regatta has been moved to September. Look for more info in the coming months as this develops. If you're a Diva consider getting out there with the ladies for a fun weekend.
- WCSC hosted the Flying Scot Dixie Lakes District Championships back in April. It was a successful event with over 20 competitors including a former Rolex Sailor of the year award winner. Congratulations John Kreidler for bringing this event to WCSC.
- -The Springboard Regatta also held in April had 15 Lightnings and 16 Highlanders in attendance. Great showing by both fleets.


Keep an eye out for them when you're at the club and make sure they know we're happy to have them with us.

Keep an eye out for Will and help him learn the ropes with us.



If you like New Orleans music you gotta love the Meters.


And the form most commonly used as a lake sailor, Spit O Meter. What does the Spit O Meter tell us? If you spit in the water and it passes you, your day is going badly.

### Keelboat Fleet

The Keelboat fleet had an interesting spring racing season with a number of races cancelled due to weather and some other races sailed in cold, windy, rainy weather. The "A Class" completed 13 of 18 scheduled races with four boats qualifying by sailing at least 7 of the races.

- Marc Bailey (Melges 24 "Screaming Mimi") scored first in all of his 8 races and thus scored first for the season (yet again!)
- Competition was close for second place. Joe Martin (Capri 25 "Spanky") was ahead of Steve Kiemele (J24 "Cahoots") by one point in 8 races but a tie developed when each threw out their worst score for the best-of-seven race total. Steve won the tie-breaker with one more first place finish than Joe. Therefore, Steve took second place for the season and Joe took third.
- The remaining qualifier was Roger Welte (J22 "Winsome Too") ending up in fourth place. It was good to have Joe Martin and the Spanky crew back on the race course.

The "B Class" completed 9 of 18 races and three boats qualified by sailing at least 5 races.

- Mike Harrison (Catalina 22 "Old Yeller") scored first with 5 points for his best of 5 races.
- Craig Lenfestey (Catalina 22 (Cattitude") finished second with 10 points for his best 5 races.
- Harold Morse (S2 6.7 "Sundance") finished third with 12 points for his best 5 races.

Our 2013 Fall Series of six race days begins September 15. Each race day, 3 races are scheduled with an intended duration of 45 minutes each. We meet in the clubhouse for lunch at 11:00 am (\$4 to \$5 donation per person expected). At 11:30 am, we have the competitors' meeting and discuss the plans for the day. The warning signal for the first race is planned for 1:00 pm with the other two races following ASAP. No race will be started after 4:30 pm. After the races, we gather at the "Tiki Bar" at the head of D dock for snacks, refreshments, scores, and "stories."

Our fleet by-laws and sailing instructions can be found on the club website under "Club Documentation, Keelboat Fleet Documentation." We sail under US Sailing's Performance Handicap Racing Formula (PHRF) where inherently faster boats (based on design, not skill) are handicapped against those that are not so inherently fast. We sail in two classes - "A" and "B" with the "A Class" being those with a PHRF rating of 189 or lower and the "B Class" boats having a rating of 190 or higher. Rating adjustments are made for sailing without a spinnaker if desired.

If you have any interest in racing, our fleet is a great way to get started. The racing is generally low-key with a minimum of "discussion" on the water. If you would like to get started as a crew member, please let me know in advance of a race day and I'll try to find you a ride.

Hello Sailors and would be Centerboard Racers!

I wanted to send out an invite to the entire club to check out the Centerboard fleet at WCSC. We have about 15 members that race in the Centerboard Fleet races that are hosted by our club. We race from March till June and then take the summer off. We reconvene in September and race thru November. All told we have 13 race dates and 39 total races throughout the year. We crown our Champion at the annual banquet in January where this year we are hoping to dethrone our 2012 Champion and Vice Commodore, Dennis Baker.

The Centerboard fleet is limited to any dinghy (including Catamarans and Weta Trimarans) under 21 feet. Our fleet consists of a lot of different boats from Force Fives, Lasers, Lightnings, Flying Scots, Thistles, Highlanders, Buccaneers, MC Scows and Weta Trimarans. Don't worry about trying to beat a faster boat...we score the races and series based on the US Sailing Portsmouth ratings. If you are not familiar with Portsmouth ratings, it's a handicap system used to adjust your boats time so you can compete with the boats of different speeds. It seems to work pretty well, as we have had many races determined by seconds. Of course each boat has it's own 'wheelhouse' wind speed, but for the most part it makes for competitive racing.

Our Centerboard fleet is also a 'social fleet'. We meet after every race at the 'Tiki Hut' at the end of the main parking lot for post race discussion and beverages. Let me use this opportunity to invite you to have a beer with us in September. We would love to meet you and introduce you to the coolest fleet at WCSC.

If you have been thinking about learning how to race, this is the fleet for you. We have lots of fleet members that are available to mentor you and shorten your racing learning curve. Don't have a Centerboard boat? Not a problem. We have plenty of boats that are available for you to try out. If you have raced before and want to come out and join us, we would love to have you.

We hold our skippers meetings at 11:30 on race dates at the Tiki Hut. Racing starts at 1:00pm. Our schedule is posted on the club web site at <a href="https://www.wcsc-sailing.org">www.wcsc-sailing.org</a>.

Any questions or need help finding a boat? A boat to crew on? Need crew? Let me know and we'll work something out.

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
