From the Vice Commodore

Well the summer heat is now upon us. While we spend time at the club, tending to boats and sailing we need to stay safe. The heat brings the challenge of staying hydrated. Men require roughly three liters of fluids per day while women require a little over 2 liters. The 8 x 8 rule (8 glasses of water, each 8 oz) is a very general rule. If perspiring heavily adjust accordingly. Be sure to drink plenty of water between enjoying other beverages.

The summer sun presents the need to protect the skin from harmful radiation. Over two million are diagnosed with skin cancer annually in the US. Use sun block, wear a hat and appropriate clothing to block the sun. A good sun block will be water resistant with an SPF (sun protection factor) of 30 or better and block both UVA and UVB ultraviolet rays. UVA rays are long wave and UVB are short wave. Both UVA and UVB cause sun burn. UVA rays age the skin penetrating deep into the dermis. UVB burns the superficial layer of the skin.

Accidents happen while sailing and working on a boat. Does your boat have a first aid kit? If so when was the last time you inspected it and changed out items which were out of date or no longer any good (dried out band-aids for instance)? I do this annually. I also make sure it is stocked with such items as Benadryl and Ibuprofen. Sharp scissors and eye wash are good to keep. As I am always working on my old boat I get into the first aid kit about three times each year.

Be aware that the club has a well stocked first aid kit next to the refrigerator in the kitchen. If you happen to deplete an item, please replace during the next visit so it is not compromised for the next user.

So how is that boat of yours? Do all the navigation lights function? Do you have an adequate number of good (not old moldy tearing orange ones) PFDs? Do you have a throw cushion or other device for MOB (Man OverBoard)? How about those fire extinguishers? I have the objective of replacing every single light on my mast with LED bulbs. With the regular incandescent types it seems as soon as I replace one the other fails.

Along that note, your Board of Stewards is working diligently to ensure that you, your children, and their children have WCSC for generations to come as a place for friends and family to bond and "encourage and support the sport of sailing, sailboat racing and the arts and sciences of seamanship and navigation." For those avid readers among you, you may recognize the quote... it is from *Article II* of the WCSC Bylaws, and is the club's mission statement. There are also subordinate purposes for the club, but the reason the club exists is to fulfill its main purpose. Luckily, while the membership is aiming

at that goal, amazing memories are made, families bond, friendships are created and deepened, and there are a lot of fun parties along the way!

The two main reasons WCSC has lasted through the years and provided a place for all of that to happen is an active, involved membership and amazingly well thought out Bylaws and Rules & Regulations. This leads me to three big projects we are working on: First, we are working on creating Rules & Regulations for the Camper Village. As many "old timers" know, since the club was founded and up until several years ago WCSC was only allowed to store full size campers near 'A' and 'B' docks - they had to be pulled to the point for use. This was due to Corps regulations that they relaxed several years ago. At that time, the area for storage was repurposed as the Camper Village with approval of on-site use and installation of power. Since that time, rules have been approved as specific needs have arisen, but a set of comprehensive R&R were never created. At this time, the Board and Camper Committee are diligently working to create a fair and durable set of rules the will serve the Camper Village for decades to come. The new R&R will be modeled after the dock slip rules (which have functioned with minor changes for 30+ years), the rules that were already approved for the Camper Village, and rules from clubs that use campers in a similar fashion (other boating clubs and hunting clubs). Hopefully this will be completed

Second, the BOS is actively pursuing a way to get each club member on a committee, and having the committees functioning as intended. The need for this has become amazingly apparent to me as I've begun my journey through the Executive Committee, but there are many reasons for members join a committee. As a committee member, fairshare hours can be obtained by doing something that matches your skill set instead of hauling tree limbs and weed eating (both necessary, too!). Your fairshare obligation can also be worked toward outside of workdays if your committee has a project or other work that needs completing (i.e. when a Harbor Committee member inspects dock lines, the time counts toward fairshare). Continuity is also created with active committees in place. It has amazed me the amount of time spent getting information on who does what or where something is located since joining the Board. With active committees in place whose members are fairly stable from year to year, the leadership is freed up to handle club improvements, maintenance, budgeting, rules issues, and a myriad of other tasks the Board is intended to handle. I think I can speak for the entire Board and say that none of us mind doing what needs to be done regardless of the task, but the club would function much more smoothly and the Board would function more efficiently with committees in place. The Bylaws list the clubs current committees with their functions, and we will get a list of other committees at the club to the membership soon. Please take a minute to look over the committees and contemplate which you would like to join. Our goal is for every member to be on at least one committee.

Third, we plan to install a new drain field for the clubhouse septic system. Oh wait... IT'S DONE!!!! Let's all have a moment of silence for the drain field... I remember a time when I would walk up the hill from my pop-up and worry about having to dodge roaches on the deck or on my way to the head, but for too many years my fear turned to what I was wading through on the hill to get to the clubhouse. Yes, even the roaches would hide as I left wet footprints of toxic who-knows-what on my trek to relieve myself. But that's all behind us! Our old drain field consisted of 600 feet of leech line – most of which wasn't working – and the new installation is 800 feet in parallel to the old system. Theoretically, the old system will still have some working capacity, and the new part should be ample to handle the biggest crowds during our regattas. The scarring will get filled in and seeded after it's had a little time to settle.

Just a few more items to consider. I am always open to suggestions for workday and non-workday projects. If you see a need, please let (Continued next page)

me know. Some of the current items I'm aware of include refurbishing/rebuilding picnic tables, finishing painting Adirondack chairs (and maybe making more), cutting and clearing limbs next to mainland boat parking lot (near 'A' dock), installing edging on docks (so docks don't scratch your topsides), painting RC boat, working on breakwater (call Ronnie about that one), rebuilding flower beds around flagpole, and eventually filling and seeding over new drain field. As I've mentioned before, these don't have to be done on workdays, but I do need to approve the work prior to it getting done. Some of these are bigger jobs and CAN be done on a workday... if you're interested in heading up one of the projects just let me know.

A word about bottom jobs... <u>bottom jobs are prohibited by DHEC on WCSC grounds!!!</u> Specifically, we are not allowed to remove bottom paint anywhere on club property due to its potential environmental impact and our lack of DHEC compliant waste collection facilities. Drapes, tarps, drop clothes, and vacuums do <u>NOT</u> make it legal to remove bottom paint at the club (not in the parking lot, bone yard, or especially on the causeway!!). That being said, you <u>are</u> allowed to <u>apply</u> bottom paint as long as none gets on the ground (drop clothes would be appropriate here). Doing other boat work is fine, too, as long as you're not leaving stuff on the ground (this includes repairing blisters, minor fiberglass work, etc.).

And finally, please attend to your boats, campers, and other equipment that is on club property. We are making a big effort to have unused/ abandoned boats and property at the club either attended to or removed. If you have a boat with a shredded tarp and 50 gallons of water in the cockpit, please drain it and get a new tarp or relocate it to your driveway. If you moved your boat and left a pile of random rigging and trash in its place, please make it look loved and straighten it or remove it from the club. There are Rules & Regulations in place regarding unused and disheveled equipment, and we are making a push to enforce those rules. We are not trying to be disrespectful or turn our *sailing* club into a *yacht* club, but equipment that is not taken care of is not fun to look at, is taking a spot that an active member could use, is a breeding ground for mosquitoes, wasps, rats, spiders, and snakes, and is a general safety hazard. Bring a cooler and offer beverages for volunteer helpers... you'll be amazed how many people will enjoy cleaning your boat with you!! A HUGE 'thank you' to everyone that has come to the workdays, everyone that has worked on side projects, Brian, the Camper Committee, and the Camper Villagers for their work, and all who have made suggestions on how to improve our club!!

Keelboat and Cruising Fleet

The 2015 Spring racing season concluded on June 7. We had 15 races over 5 race days - one scheduled race day lacked sufficient wind for even one race. Over the season, 10 "A Fleet" boats and 7 "B Fleet" boats participated.

In "A Fleet," Marc Bailey (Melges 24, Screaming Mimi) again won convincingly with an average finish of 1.33 and 8 points using his best 8 races. Up and coming Chuck Ballew (Ultimate 20, Mischief) finished second with a 2.36 average and 13 points. Your author Steve Kiemele (J/70, White Rabbit) took third with a 2.91 average and 20 points. The remaining qualifiers (having raced over half of the races held) were Roger Welte (J/22, Winsome Too) and Wayne Cheser (J/80, Road Kill) finishing fourth and fifth, respectively.

In "B Fleet," The Harders (variously Dick, Paul, and Ryan) again dominated the fleet with the Lindenburg 22, Lucky Lindy. Their finishes averaged 1.25 and totaled 8 points. Mike Harrison (Catalina 22, Old Yeller) took second with an average finish of 2.47 and 14 points. Close behind was Brian Hampton (Santana 20, Chubasco) in third place with an average finish of 2.58 and 19 points. The remaining qualifiers, Dawna Uchtmann (Capri 22, Anejo) and Craig Lenfestey (Catalina 22, Cattitude), were fourth and fifth, respectively. The fleet bids a fond adieu to the Uctmanns and Craig Lenfestey who are moving out of the area. If you are interested in good boats, I think that both of these folks have theirs for sale.

A number of the Keelboat Fleet members participated in the Good Dam Distance Race. Marc Bailey took first, Paul Harder (sailing alone) took second, and your author took third. Several members also raced in the Around Anderson Island Race, although not all were sailing keelboats. Rear Commodore Will DeHart finished first single-hand overall and first in the single-hand multihull division sailing a Hobie 16. Paul Harder finished first in the single-hand monohull division with Lucky Lindy. Chris Miros finished first in the crewed monohull division with his J/24, and your author took first to finish and first in the crewed multihull division with a Hobie 18.

These distance events are a great way to begin racing. They use a "pursuit" start format where each boat is assigned a starting time based on the boat design's speed potential. The slower boats start first with faster boats starting proportionately later. In theory, all of the boats should finish together. If you pass a boat at any time in the race, you are ahead of it at that point. Also, the starting line is not crowded as there is rarely more than one boat starting at a time.

Our 2015 Fall Series commences Sunday, September 20.

On each of 6 race days in the season, 3 races for the A and B classes of the Keelboat Fleet are scheduled with an intended duration of 45 minutes each. We meet in the clubhouse for lunch at 11:00 am (\$4 to \$5 donation per person expected). At 11:30 am, we have the competitors' meeting and discuss the plans for the day. The warning signal for the first race is planned for 1:00 pm with the other two races following ASAP. No race will be started after 4:30 pm. After the races, we gather at the "Tiki Bar" at the head of D dock for snacks, refreshments (adult beverages provided and selected by the Fleet Beverage Consultant), scores, and "stories." Times are shifted an hour earlier after daylight savings time ends.

Our fleet by-laws and sailing instructions can be found on the club website under "Club Documentation, Keelboat Fleet Documentation." We sail under US Sailing's Performance Handicap Racing Formula (PHRF) where inherently faster boats (based on design, not skill) are handicapped against those that are not so inherently fast. We sail in two classes - "A" and "B" - with the "A Class" being those with a PHRF rating of 189 or lower and the "B Class" boats having a rating of 190 or higher. Rating adjustments are made for sailing without a spinnaker if desired. Boats kept in the water receive a rating adjustment for that disadvantage too.

If you have any interest in racing, or just improving your sailing skills by comparing your performance with others, our fleet is a great way to get started. The racing is generally low-key with a minimum of "discussion" on the water. If you would like to get started as a crew member, please let me know in advance of a race day and I'll try to find you a ride.

July 11th Cruising Event


Martha cruise, beach party and dinghy race.

2015 Club Championship Regatta

The Club Championship Regatta was held May 16-17 this year. This is a little later than the past few years as April filled up quickly with other events. Our punctuality was not rewarded. Our PRO, Billy Lacher, had to go into postpone and wait for breeze. We finally got a nice 2mph gusting to 3mph and we were off like a herd of turtles. But we went to drifting conditions by the windward mark. At the start, I was on the line and about 2 minutes ahead of Dan and Derek. By the windward mark, Derek was first, Dan second and me third. The downwind leg seemed like forever and the order remained the same at the rounding but the pack was tight. I made it inside Dan, caught Derek on some lucky boat wake acceleration and then the breeze filled a little with me getting bullet by less than a minute followed by Derek and Dan. The second race was a fight for the start between Derek and I with Dan being the winner as Derek and I were both over early and had to restart. In trying to restart, Derek fouled my rudder with a nice thud and was off to do his penalty. Dan rounded the windward mark first and at the leeward mark looked to be on his way to a wire to wire win. Then his boom hit the mark and during his penalty, I passed and held off a super fast and thank God the course isn't any longer, Derek along with Dan, for bullet number two. With the other two competitors scoring 5 points total (each), I didn't need a third race to win the qualifier series. Thanks to a great and patient race committee and to the great competitors who graced the lake of play. Hopefully the next day would bring more wind.

Saturday night we had a wonderful dinner. This is the third year of the Champion's Dinner and each year it gets better. Jeremy Marsh smoked two boston butts at 250 for 10 hours and they were fall apart good. We did a little chicken pesto dish in the oven along with green beans (cooked overnight on the grill) and corn on the cob. Dana Lacher contributed a goat cheese, pesto baguette to start and grasshopper pie for dessert along with chocolate cake and fresh raspberries. Makes you hungry just reading, eh?

Even though Commodore Derek Lord requested wind in giving thanks the night before, Sunday left us a little light. Ronnie Ashmore, Mike Harrison, Marc Bailey and myself left the dock in about 2mph gusting to 5mph. We sailed the first race in minimal breeze and Ronnie took the bullet followed by Marc, me and Mike. For race number 2, Marc found his way out front. I fought from behind to pass Mike for second on the last beat. Ronnie got just a little behind and then the wind really died. He took about 10 minutes to finish after Mike. With the wind dead and after waiting a little, our steely eyed PRO moved the course up the lake about 600 yards in search of more breeze. He was rewarded and we started race three in promising 3mph breeze. I was OCS and Mike led the fleet around the windward mark. Marc passed for the lead in the run and Mike held off Ronnie to round third at the leeward mark. With all that strategy going on up front, I was able to make us some ground and round pretty close to the pack. Ronnie picked off Mike on the last beat and got second. Mike held me off for third and of course I brought up the rear with my fourth. Since Marc scored another bullet in Race 4, there was no need to sail the rest of the races. Congratulations Marc Bailey!!

The next question is what boat will we sail next year and can we find a weekend with more wind?

How to Pay Extra in Your Next Quarterly Bill

Part of what WCSC is about, is racing. The membership is key to supporting the racing events that are scheduled each season. Without our members, it could not happen.

Recently, multiple members did not show up for Race Committee. Not only does this make it hard for the PRO to run races, these members will see a fine in their next club billing. This is not what we want to do...and would much rather see you on the Race Committee.

As part of your membership obligation, each member is required to perform one Race Committee duty during the year. As your date approaches, a couple key items to take into consideration:

- Each member is responsible for identifying when they are scheduled to perform their respective RC duty. Please look at the schedule on the web site or the calendar that was included in your first quarter bill. The schedule is also published on the web site *and* the back page of the Windsong with each members name who is scheduled for that quarter's races.
- We try to encourage all PRO's (Principle Race Officer) to contact all members prior to their race date. However, this is only a courtesy and is not required. It is *your* responsibility to identify the date that you are scheduled.
- Please arrive at the club no later than two hours before the first race. Race times are published in the Windsong or on the Website, but are typically at 13:00. This means you need to be on the grounds at 11:00. You will meet your PRO either at the RC boat (located on C dock), the race shed or the club house.
- Make sure you bring proper clothing, sunscreen, hat, sunglasses and plenty to drink or eat. You will probably be on the RC boat or Skiff for 3 to 4 hours.
- You don't need to know anything about racing. Your PRO will instruct you on what to do and when to do it. He needs your help to run a good race for the competitors.

Remember, if you are unable to attend it is your responsibility to find a substitute. You can use the Google forum, club Facebook page, or email to find other members who might want to swap race duties. If you do not attend, our club rules have a fine system that will be enforced. Thank you for your support.
