FROM THE VICE COMMODORE


Welcome to the last quarter of 2019! I hope that everyone is still having a great year and have been getting to the Club and getting involved!

The summer racing was pretty successful this summer with the Friday Dinghy Nights leading the charge. I understand the Saturday PHRF series had some issues, but still not bad for the first year trying to get more people out on the water. I expect both of these series will take place again next summer!

The fall racing series got under way in September and I have to say, it was good to get back to racing! It's mid-September as I write this, so, as we all know, it has not cooled off much yet... but we're hopeful! I'm looking forward to some spectacular fall weather and sailing.

The board of Stewards continue to meet monthly taking care of the business of the club. The meetings are open to the membership, so if you're ever interested, come join us on the first Tuesday of the month!

As wet as it was early in the year, rain has apparently stopped around here, and lake levels are slowly falling. This is typical this time of year, but still, it sure was nice to have a full lake for so long! The lake is currently at 657.65 (as of September 16, 2019). - Hospice Regatta: The premier event of the sailing season, a 2-day regatta helping Hospice of the Upstate raise money for their programs. FROM THE REAR COMMODORE

For the times they are a-changin'. This phrase was going through my head as I was thinking about what to put in my Rear Commodore article. I had to look up where I heard it and wasn't surprised it was a song by Bob Dylan—my dad had music going all the time when I was growing up. As I'm sure many of you have heard, the club is moving to a new billing system with a local accountant in Anderson, SC, in preparation for the well-deserved and overdue retirement of Mary Ann Caldwell.

It's not going to be easy- gone are the days you will be able to call her up and make your equipment changes. Forget about writing a quick note on your bill as you send in your payment, letting her know you did your fair share hours. No more stopping by her house, making payments or handing over forms (though I'm pretty sure she's ok with you stopping by to say hello).

The New Billing System Team, along with your flag officers and a few other members, have been working diligently to put in place the new processes to handle the zillion things Mary Ann has done for the past 37 years. There will be new rules and regulations, better utilization of our website and its capabilities, and even a bylaws change that will be voted on at the annual meeting in November. Look for more information elsewhere in this Windsong, in special mailings, and on the website in the coming months.

Moving on to normal rear commodore stuff, I am looking for help on three committees. First, I would like to have someone in charge of making sure the equipment we have is in running order before workdays. This equipment includes chainsaws, weedeaters and a lawn mower. The time put in to keep them running obviously qualifies for fair share hours. If this is up your alley, shoot me an email with your resume. Haha, just kidding, but prior experience is a must.

I'm also looking for additional help on the House Committee. It's too big of a job for one person. This includes the care, maintenance and management of the clubhouse and the mainland head, purchasing supplies, enforcing the rules of using the clubhouse and making recommendations to the Board of Stewards for renovations and improvement projects. The work you do maintaining the clubhouse also counts as fair share hours. Let me know if this is something you would be interested in and I will get you in touch with Chairman Scooter Marett.

Lastly, I am looking for help with the Dry Storage Committee. This will count towards fair share in 2020 with the implementation of the new billing system and its procedures. Dry storage will now have 'dock captains' that will be responsible for their individual areas of dry storage. Why, you ask? At last count, dry storage has 168 boats with trailers and over 100 other pieces of equipment (dinghys, empty trailers, pop up campers, etc.) to monitor, currently with one person doing all the work. Compare that to docks and moorings that have 7 people monitoring 109 boats. A little crazy, eh? I need at least 4 people who frequent the club regularly and are willing to monitor sections of dry storage on a quarterly basis. This includes the Chairperson, who will coordinate all of dry storage, and three Captains, each managing one of the 'newly established' dry storage areas. The first area will be mainland boats and equipment, including Cat beach and the upper and lower mainland lots, monitored by the Mainland Captain. The second area encompasses the 'island' boats and equipment including the dolly lot off the causeway, the main launch ramp lot and the lot above the garage, monitored by the Island Captain. The last area will be in charge of the four dinghy racks and maybe a future fifth rack for D and E docks, monitored by the Dinghy Captain (well, maybe we call them Zone Captains). Also, at some point in the near future, the current racks will need to be re-built and possibly redesigned. I'm hoping someone will step up and take on that task. Thank you Ben Gibson, for doing the impossible task of dry storage for the past 3 years and Dennis Baker for doing it the 9 years before him.

My closing thought is that this is an all-volunteer club and you will get out of it what you put into it. Think about how lousy our club would be without all the volunteers that make it what it is today. What are YOU doing for WCSC?

2019 HOSPICE REGATTA: OCTOBER 11-13

It's hard to believe the 2019 Hospice Regatta is right around the corner and coming up fast. Preparations have been underway for the 2019 event and the team has been working hard to make all the plans to host another great event and to meet our goal of \$85,000 for Hospice of the Upstate. We need your help to accomplish this lofty goal. So, help us blow this number out of the water!

If you are going to sail in the event, please register early. This will help us with the planning to make sure we have enough food, drink and other great stuff available for you and your crew. Beat the deadline as the fees go up after Friday, October 4th. You can imagine the planning involved to ensure that we have enough food and drink for 350 hungry sailors, so in order to help prevent us from running out, we have early discounts on registration and food.

New Registration Website This Year

This year we are using a new registration website that is geared towards fundraising. This new site allows you to do all the registration stuff that we have provided in the past, and in addition it allows each participant to set up a unique fundraising page that you can use to support our Sailing For Others program.

You can make donations, purchase additional meal tickets, order cool Regatta clothing, and buy 50/50 raffle tickets- all online. Everything you need is on the website including the NOR and 'who is attending' lists, along with other information.

When you register, you will set up your Sailing For Others fundraising web page that will track your donations in real time. It also has cool tools for sending out links, including personal emails to your friends and family, directing them back to your donation page. Take advantage of the new web features and watch your donations grow!

50/50 Raffles- With a Twist!

We have something new this year! We are offering a fun way of raising money for Hospice of the Upstate, and providing a great raffle drawing for some lucky winners. For a \$25 (tax-deductible, I might add) donation, you will enter a drawing that will be held on Sunday at the awards ceremony. The drawing will be for cold hard cash. This will also be a non-spinnaker class. This is a great way to include a whole class of boats who can compete against each other with similar construction characteristics. Get your friends and family together and get your boat out of the slip and join us in supporting Hospice this year! You will enjoy it!

Sailing for Others

We will again be holding the Sailing for Others sponsorship challenge to help raise funds. This program is not limited to just skippers. We encourage anyone who is attending the event and wants to help us raise money to start lining up your friends, family and coworkers to help. Everything can be done online at www.wcsc-sailing.org, following the links to the Regatta web site. Again, this year we are giving away one-year membership dues to WCSC. That's right, one year of free membership dues to WCSC will be the winning raffle item. We will also draw 2nd place (6 months free membership dues) and 3rd place (3 months free membership dues). Note: this does not include any boat, slip, storage or equipment fees, only your quarterly membership dues - up to \$616 in value!





NEW CLUB BILLING SYSTEM

First things first. We need to give Mary Ann Caldwell a HUGE Thank You for over 35 years of club billing work. She has provided a value to the club that we will never be able to repay. Her dedication and support to the club has been nothing short of incredible.

With that all said, she wants to retire. And that means a new billing system and accounting team to help administer our quarterly billing process. Expect a lot of details to come over the next several months. Some key points to note:

- We will be using 'The Alliance' as our accounting support team. They are located in Anderson, SC and will support club billing and accounts payable for WCSC.
- Our new billing system will be running on an Enterprise version of Quick Books, located at The Alliance.
- We will go live with the new system on January 1, 2020. Invoices mailed for the first quarter 2020 will be from the new system.
- You will send your 1st quarter payment to The Alliance- not to Mary Ann or to the address you previously have been using. If you do online bill pay, you will need to change the name and address of WCSC in your bank system (but not yet). Sending your 1st quarter 2020 payment to Mary Ann could cause your payment to be posted late. More details and the new payment address will come soon.
- Our new system will allow us to do online billing and receive payments online via credit cards. The first invoice for the 2020 first quarter will be mailed. We will start taking online billing requests in the first quarter. Look for more information on this.
- Each Flag officer is working hard on new processes to support a lot of the manual phone calls, emails, and verbal information regarding boats, equipment, insurance, fair share hours, etc. A lot is changing to support the new system.

You will see a lot more communication and emails related to the new system in the 4th quarter of 2019. Stay tuned...

And if you get a chance, take a minute to thank Mary Ann for 35+ years of hard work.

The Fall racing season began on September 14. We got three races in on a hot, light air day – with fairly consistent 6 to 7 MPH breeze.

Racing was tight in A fleet with Vice Commodore John Barnard taking the win in the first two races. George Masson won the third race and was second in the first two. John Gulyas dominated B fleet with three wins.

The Keelboat Fleet races 12 days per year, 6 days in a spring season from March to June and 6 days in a fall season from September to November. The initial spring and final fall race days are scheduled as distance events around government buoys. On the other days, 3 races around inflatable marks are scheduled with an intended duration of 45 minutes each. At 11:30 am, we have the competitors' meeting in the main parking lot and discuss the plans for the day. The warning signal for the first race is planned for 1:00 pm with the other two races following ASAP. No race will be started after 4:30 pm. After the races, we gather at the "Tiki Bar" at the head of D dock for snacks, refreshments (adult beverages provided and curated by the Fleet Beverage Consultant), and "stories."

Our fleet by-laws and sailing instructions can be found on the club website under "Club Documentation, Keelboat Fleet Documentation." We sail under US Sailing's Performance Handicap Racing Formula (PHRF) where inherently faster boats (based on boat design, not sailor skill) are handicapped against those that are not so inherently fast. We sail in two classes - "A" and "B" - with the "A Class" being those inherently faster with a PHRF rating of 189 or lower and the "B Class" boats having a rating of 190 or higher. Rating adjustments are made for sailing without a spinnaker if desired. Boats kept in the water receive a rating adjustment for that disadvantage too.

If you have any interest in racing, or just improving your sailing skills by comparing your performance with others, our fleet is a great way to get started. The racing is generally low-key with a minimum of "discussion" on the water. If you own a keelboat, come out on a race day and give it a try. If you like it, you can join later. "Cruisers" are welcome to participate and will be given their own start if they desire. If you have interest in crewing, contact me and I'll try to find you a ride.
